Christmas Annual - Call for Papers - September 5 Submission Deadline - "Holmes in Motion"

Ray Riethmeier and Phil Bergem are once again compiling and editing the Norwegian Explorers Christmas Annual and are requesting content for inclusion in this year's publication. It is distributed each year to attendees of the Norwegian Explorers Annual Dinner in December, and additional copies are made available to interested Sherlockians around the world.

This year's theme will be "Holmes in Motion." Transportation plays a significant role in the Sherlock Holmes stories. Travel by train to adventures away from London is an iconic scene for our heroes, as are rides in hansom cabs, or going out for a stroll. The stories also involve a fair number of ships, bicycles, and even the Underground, which — though seldom mentioned — was readily available. Another way we find Holmes in motion is through performance, be it on stage, television, or motion pictures. The Christmas Annual for this year will explore a wide avenue of possible topics derived from locomotion in the sixty Canonical tales, or presentations on stage and screen. We are looking for articles, pastiches, poems, puzzles, or artwork exploring anything from a specific way Holmes or Watson may have travelled, something about transportation in the Victorian era in general, or the way we remember the characters from performances over the years. However Holmes manages to move us, we want you to share it!

Watson's old life isn't done with him, though - Moriarty and Watson are set to write their own chapter of a story that has fascinated audiences for more than a century. Watson is a medical show with a strong investigative spine, featuring a modern version of one of history's greatest detectives as he turns his attention from solving crimes to solving medical mysteries.

Study Group Discussion Questions:

Steve Schier will lead the group in a discussion of "The Adventure of the Naval Treaty" via a Zoom gathering. See discussion questions below.

- 1. At 12,701 words, this tale is the longest of all 56 Canonical short stories some 50 percent longer than the average, in fact. What does it have, by way of plot, character, atmosphere or skill in storytelling, to justify such verbosity?
- 2. Could you shorten the text to increase the impact of the story? If so, how?
- 3. To Holmes, do you think Percy Phelps' sudden ability to remember details of the night nine weeks ago would have been suspicious? Why or why not?
- 4. Would the commissionaire have witnessed Joseph fleeing with the document? If so, why didn't she give him away?
- 5. Why might Watson have been reluctant to suspect Lord Holdhurst despite Holmes' observations?
- 6. Why would Joseph have carried the knife into the bedroom if he assumed Percy was still bedridden? Do you think Joseph would have killed Percy?
- 7. What role, if any, did Annie have in the theft and scheme?
- 8. Surprisingly, Percy Phelps doesn't smoke or drink. Most of his contemporaries did. Is there evidence in the story of Percy enjoying other "vices?"
- 9. Is Holmes' digression on the beauty of a moss rose a high point in the Canon or mere gratuitous sentimentality and a distraction to the reader?
- 10. Holmes said that in the course of his interview with Percy he'd been furnished with seven clues to test. What are those seven clues?
- 11. "Watson here will tell you that I never can resist a touch of the dramatic," Holmes told Percy. I like to think Mrs. Hudson has some dramatic tendencies herself, being an apparently willing participant in the little joke played on Percy. In the name of drama, however, wasn't the treaty exposed to some risk in the kitchens of 221B? Would you entrust Mediterranean security and world peace to your landlady?
- 12. How satisfied are you with the difficulty and solution of this mystery? Where does it rank among the quality of the stories in the Canon?
